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Oakland Public Schools — Explores New Initiatives

he 2015 summer/fall has been a very busy one here at **Support** The Oakland Public Schools. We are very excited to introduce 7 new courses for the 2015 - 2016 school year at Valley Middle School. These courses will challenge, support, and encourage students to explore the areas of Financial Literacy, Robotics, S.T.E.A.M., and Italian. At the elementary schools, we have begun our new Balanced Literacy initiative to promote best practices in literacy instruction.

Financial Literacy

The New Jersey 21st Century Life and Careers Standard, which includes the 12 Career Ready Practices, establishes clear guidelines for what students need to know and be able to do in order to be successful in their future careers and to



achieve financial independence. This standard outlines the important fiscal knowledge, habits, and skills that must be mastered in order for students to make informed decisions

about personal finance. Financial literacy is an integral component of a student's college and career readiness, enabling students to achieve fulfilling, financially secure, and successful careers. To that end, Valley Middle School will implement two new courses for the 2015-2016 school year: Financial Literacy 7 and Financial Literacy 8.

Italian

Last year our grade 6 students cycled through marking period classes in Spanish, French, and Italian. At the end of 6th grade students chose the language that they would continue to study in 7th and 8th grade. The 7th grade Italian class will emphasize basic learning but in a more conversational based presentation.

Balanced Literacy

The Office of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment have been busy getting ready for the continued implementation of many new programs within the Oakland School District. We strive to provide and sustain a rich academic environment where students achieve their academic and personal potential. With this striving environment, summer work in the area of English Language Arts Literacy has focused on the implementation of the Balanced Literacy initiative in each of elementary schools for this school year. At the middle school level, we carefully selected new novels to enhance the curriculum, meet the demands of the standards and keeping in mind student interests. Many teachers in July participated in the Summer Paramus Reading Institute where student learning is paramount for success.

Each student at VMS will receive one Support period a week. The support period is designed to provide students with the opportunity to complete homework, organized their binders and class notes, meet with teacher to make up tests/ quizzes, visit the library, or work in IXL.

Robotics

The primary purpose of this course is to educate students in the thinking process used by engineers. This course will also build upon the Technology Education course offered at the sixth grade level. Students use the tech-



nological design and problem-solving method to engage in activities that simulate the role of engineers. Identifying technological problems, researching potential solutions, modeling, prototype development, testing, and evaluation are integral components of the course. Concepts of structures, productions, and engineering graphics and robotic engineering are emphasized.

Presentation skills (verbal, visual, and written), application of knowledge learned in other disciplines, and careers are integrated into the course. Students use Chromebooks as a designing tool and to simulate results before actual modeling and prototyping begins. .

S.T.E.A.M.

The 6th grade STEAM 101 course integrates physical science, mathematics (data collection, analysis, and graphing); problem solving, technology, engineering, language, and art. The purpose of this course is to develop skills in problem solving, collaboration, and communication in order to investigate a problem and design solutions while working in a structured, team environment.

S.T.E.A.M. 102 takes the problem solving and engineering skills that students have gained in grade 6 STEAM and further advance the mathematical and scientific concepts and student responsibilities. The students will start to engage in more independent problem solving and design oriented tasks, and will also have the opportunity to collaborate with larger groups to further refine their work. As the students advance throughout the marking period long course, they will have the opportunity to design a prototype CO2 dragster, apply that prototype to a constructed and refined final product, and computer design and integrate 3D plastic wheels for their final product dragster. The course will culminate with a series of races that will help the students gather data for their final analysis of the effectiveness of their design process. Discussion will take place between students to analyze and critique the positives and negatives of the final designs and apply these lessons to future projects.

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OAKLAND POLICE DEPT — FALL REMINDERS

all is here and the Oakland Police Department would like to put out a few reminders to our residents. First and foremost, school is open. Because the weather is still fairly nice this time of year, children like to walk to and from school. Sometimes around this time of year, you have many things going on in your heads, but please be mindful of extra pedestrian traffic in town. Remember, it is the law for a motorist to STOP for pedestrians in crosswalks! It is equally important for motorists to obey crossing guards. Our crossing guards do an excellent job preserving the safety of our children so be aware of their presence.

For our Valley Middle School parents, you may have noticed that the traffic pattern has changed in the area around the school. The Police Department and the school have discussed different options at length to ensure the safety of the children around the parking lot and roadways near Valley

Middle School. Please be aware that the things that are happening in that area are for safety reasons and it is important to follow the rules that the school has set forth for drop off and pick up.

Another issue the fall brings is that of falling leaves. Not only are they a nuisance to clean up but they also can be hazardous to the motoring public. Wet leaves on the roadway are very slippery, so please use extra caution when the roadway is wet and covered with leaves.

And just a reminder.....winter will soon be here. Please be aware that the sidewalks and hydrants that are on your property are your responsibility. You are required to shovel your walks and clean the snow from around the hydrants. This will make the walkways safer for our children and other pedestrians and help out the fire department in case there is a fire emergency in your area.

OAKLAND CODE ENFORCEMENT — REPLACE SMOKE DETECTOR BATTERIES

s residents prepare for winter the Oakland Fire Prevention Bureau reminds residents to replace your smoke detector batteries. Smoke detectors are your first line of defense in the event of a fire. Residents are also reminded that storage of gasoline or kerosene inside your garage or house can be unhealthy and even fatal if there is a fire. Gasoline with its additives lessens its storage time. Old gas is not useful and will even prevent engines, motors and generators from operating when needed. Gasoline and Kerosene should only be stored in approved containers, red for gas and blue for Kerosene and stored in sheds but not inside houses or garages. Gasoline and Kerosene should only be stored for imminent events and used or discarded properly after the event has passed.

The Oakland Building Department wants to remind residents that any home improvement contractor must be licensed with the State of New Jersey. Home Improvement contractors must provide their ID number on any proposal or invoice. Any contractor doing electrical or plumbing work must also be licensed with the State of New Jersey. Remember, the Department of Consumer Affairs rule is that final payment to the contractor is not required to be made before a final inspection is performed. All permitted work must be inspected by the Oakland Building Department. If you need to schedule an inspection or have permit questions contact us at 201-337-1644. Report any contractors who come to your house unannounced and tell you that work <u>must</u> be done or you have to have work done immediately to the Oakland Police Department. Soliciting is not permitted in Oakland without proper approvals.

If you are planning on moving from Oakland remember that a Continued Certificate of Occupancy (CCO) is required. Applications may be obtained at the Building Department. All applications must be completed, paid for and signed off by the Oakland Board of Health before a CCO inspection

can be scheduled. All open permits must be closed. Bank foreclosed properties and vacant home purchases are not exempt from the CCO program. Buyers of these properties should contact their attorney for guidance in complying with the CCO in Oakland. Please contact Ralph Porrino at 201-337-9616 for CCO information and inspections.

Borough Gets AAA Rating!

he Borough of Oakland achieved a AAA bond rating from Standard and Poor's this past spring. This rating allows Oakland the best financing terms available, to accelerate principal payments and reduce total interest paid without increasing its debt service budget. Another way to say this is that we will be able to pay down debt faster and at less cost.

The upgrade in Oakland's bond rating is a direct result of several years of financial planning and implementation. Beginning in 2007, Oakland has enacted policies, stringent financial controls and reporting that had have made this rating possible. By hiring a new Borough Administrator and full time Chief Financial Officer we brought in very capable administrators to implement those policies. As a result, we have shown how the Borough council can work together to accomplish difficult tasks. It is not a result of any one person or group's input but rather a result of cooperation, implementation and execution. With this sound financial footing Oakland has a bright future.

Thank you to the entire staff, elected officials, as well as the residents of Oakland for working with the Council. Without these cooperative efforts, hard work and dedication, this would not have been possible.

Twenty-two more new trees will be planted at the recreation complex including 8 decorative trees behind the outfield fence of Field 5. Solemn and important memorials have been placed at the recreation complex. Behind Field 8 there is a new memorial rock with plaque commemorating CPL Patrick Lawlor, who Lawlor Drive is named after. By Field 2, the Joey Gaul Field has a new park bench that adds character and class to the field. These tributes are important reminders of our fellow Oaklanders that left us too soon yet enjoyed the complex just as we do today and others will in the future.

feel free to send them our information and we will give them a personal tour of the Van Allen and Stream House properties.

The first large section of the roof was restored with cedar shake shingles, copper and a good deal of hand finished carpentry on site. We restored the dormers, which were raised off on the front of the house, and thus had to build windows (with ropes!) for those dormers from scratch.

We've also had several events this

fall, which included a book signing by the authors of a historical fiction children's book called *Patriots*, *Redcoats and Spies* and the grammar school children made their annual trip to the properties.

The Ramapough Conservancy does many things in the community you may not be aware of. We co-teach environmental courses at local universities, we work on and are in the process of purchasing open space properties, we sit on the board of the New Jersey Highlands Coalition and advocate for the protection of our drinking water (Oakland is 100% dependent on the forest for its drinking water). We also give mitigation

support to projects impacting the land (pipelines). We support the Native American culture of the mountains, evident in our area since 10,000 B.C. We have interns, volunteers, geologists and archaeologists.

If you want to attend any of our events, learn about interning opportunities, volunteer for working on the Van Allen House (we need cleaning and gardening help), or simply want to hang around while we attend all kinds of hearings, meetings, and the like, please by all means let us know. Thank you!

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Oakland Health Department— Flu Season, Protect Yourself Today



It's time for your Flu Shot! - Flu Season is upon us which means it is time for your Flu Shot. The many locations where the vaccination is offered makes it simple and convenient. Protect yourself and your family by scheduling your flu shot today.

Oakland Annual Free Rabies Clinic - Saturday, November 14th, 1-3 PM, Oakland Recreation Storage Shed, 24 Lawlor Drive. Cats must be in carriers and dogs must be on a leash. Written proof of previous rabies vaccination is required for your pet to be eligible for a three-year vaccination. Otherwise, a one-year vaccination will be administered. Program will be held rain or shine. This is the only free rabies vaccination clinic scheduled.

- Most adults with mental health symptoms (78%) and without mental health symptoms (89%) agreed that treatment can help persons with mental illness lead nor-
- 57% of all adults believed that people are caring and sympathetic to persons with mental illness.
- Only 25% of adults with mental health symptoms believed that people are caring and sympathetic to per-

sons with mental illness.

These findings highlight both the need to educate the public about how to support persons with mental illness and the need to reduce barriers for those seeking or receiving treatment for mental illness.
