MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT: Mayor Schwager announced that this meeting is being held in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law, duly announced, advertised and posted in the Municipal Building. The meeting will adjourn at 10:00 pm unless a majority of the Councilmembers that are present vote to extend the time.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Schwager advised that a productive and informative meeting was held last night to discuss water. She thanked Borough Engineers Kevin Boswell and Giselle Diaz for their information. Mayor Schwager attended an Eagle Scout ceremony this past weekend. She gave kudos to Troop 49. Mayor Schwager attended the installation of Pastor Courtney Smith of the Messiah Lutheran Church. Winter Wonderland at Van Saun Park opened this past weekend. Oakland will have the Christmas Tree and Menorah Lighting ceremony on December 5th at 5:00 pm. The annual Holiday decorating contest registration is due by December 18th

OPENED FOR PUBLIC COMMENT:

On motion of Councilman Biale, seconded by Councilman Pignatelli, this portion of the meeting be opened for public comment.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Kulmala, Pignatelli, Slasinski, Talamini, Van Eck.

Nancy Krause, 22 Hickory Drive, spoke of the potential group home at 14 Hickory Drive. She advised that there is a lot of traffic on Hickory because it is used as a cut-through. She thinks there are better locations for the home.

Terry Vollmin, 16 Hickory Drive, stated that the property at 14 Hickory is very narrow and long and is all rock. She does not think this group home should go on Hickory.

Phil Malloy, 21 Hickory Drive, has been a resident for 64 years and is upset by this group home. He doesn't think it belongs on Hickory Drive and is not fair to the homeowners. Mr. Malloy showed a notice he received in December 2020 about a hearing for this property. Borough Engineer John Yakimik advised this was for an application for a single family home that was withdrawn.

Michael McMorrow, 4 Hickory Drive, asked why the residents didn't know about this group home. Mr. Kunze explained that the potential developer approached the Mayor and Council about needing a resolution of support for a funding request with the County. The developer would still have to go before the Board for a site plan and the residents will be notified of that. At the last meeting, the Governing Body asked if the company could send out letters to the residents within 200 feet of this property. Councilman Kulmala explained that at the last meeting, the Council tabled the resolution of support for the grant and directed the company to notify the residents. Councilman Van Eck advised that there was a presentation two meetings ago and he raised major concerns with this.

Michael Salo, 17 Hickory Drive, is against the group home.

RESOLUTION 21-329 REVISE AFFIRMATIVE MARKETING PLAN

On motion of Councilman Van Eck, seconded by Councilman Kulmala, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, in accordance with the regulations of COAH pursuant to N.JA.C. 5:93-1, et seq., the New Jersey Uniform Housing Affordability Controls pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:80-26., et seq., and in the Matter of the Application of the Borough of Oakland, County of Bergen, Docket No. BER-L-6274-15 regarding In re N.J.A.C. 5:96 and 5:97, 221 N.J. 1, 30 (2015) ("Mount Laurel IV"), the Borough of Oakland is required to adopt by resolution an Affirmative Marketing Plan to ensure that all affordable housing units created, including those created by the rehabilitation of rental housing units within the Borough of Oakland, are affirmatively marketed to low and moderate income households, particularly those living and/or working within Housing Region 1, which encompasses the Borough of Oakland

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, do hereby adopt the following Affirmative Marketing Plan:

Affirmative Marketing Plan

- A. All affordable housing units in the Borough of Oakland shall be marketed in accordance with the provisions herein unless otherwise provided in COAH's Rules at N.J.A.C. 5:93-1, et seq.
- B. The Borough of Oakland has a Third Round obligation. This Affirmative Marketing Plan shall apply to all developments that contain or will contain low and moderate income units, including those that are part of the Borough's current Housing Element and Fair Share Plan and those that may be constructed in future developments not contemplated in the Borough's Housing Element and Fair Share Plan. This Affirmative Marketing Plan shall also apply to any rehabilitated rental units that are vacated and re-rented during the applicable period of controls for rehabilitated rental units.
- C. The Affirmative Marketing Plan shall be implemented by the Administrative Agent under contract to the Borough of Oakland. All costs of advertising and affirmatively marketing affordable housing units shall be borne by the developer/seller/owner of the affordable unit(s).
- D. In implementing the Affirmative Marketing Plan, the Administrative Agent, acting on behalf

of the Borough of Oakland, shall undertake the following strategies:

- 1. Publication of one advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation within the housing region.
- 2. Broadcast of one advertisement by a radio or television station broadcasting throughout the housing region.
- 3. At least one additional regional marketing strategy using one of the other sources listed below.
- E. The Affirmative Marketing Plan is a regional marketing strategy designed to attract buyers and/or renters of all majority and minority groups, regardless of race, creed, color, national origin, ancestry, marital or familial status, gender, affectional or sexual orientation, disability, age or number of children to housing units which are being marketed by a developer or sponsor of affordable housing. The Affirmative Marketing Plan is also intended to target those potentially eligible persons who are least likely to apply for affordable units in the region. It is a continuing program that directs all marketing activities toward the COAH Housing Region in which the Borough is located and covers the entire period of deed restriction for each restricted housing unit. The Borough of Oakland is located in COAH Housing Region 1, and is comprised of Bergen, Hudson, Passaic and Sussex Counties.
- F. The Affirmative Marketing Plan is a continuing program intended to be followed throughout the entire period of restrictions and shall meet the following requirements:
- 1. All newspaper articles, announcements and requests for application for low and moderate income units shall appear in the Bergen Record and Star Ledger.

- 2. The primary marketing shall take the form of at least one press release and a paid display advertisement in the above newspapers once a week for four consecutive weeks. Additional advertising and publicity shall be on an "as needed" basis. The developer/owner shall disseminate all public service announcements and pay for display advertisements. The developer/owner shall provide proof of publication to the Borough's Administrative Agent. All press releases and advertisements shall be approved in advance by the Borough's Administrative Agent.
- 3. The advertisement shall include a description of the:
- 1. Location of the units;
- ii. Direction of the units;
- iii. Range of prices for the units;
 - iv. Size, as measured in bedrooms, of units;
- v. Maximum income permitted to qualify for the units;
- vi. Location of applications;
- vii. Business hours when households may obtain an application; and
- viii. Application fees.
- 4. Newspaper articles, announcements and information on where to request applications for low and moderate income housing shall appear at least once a week for four consecutive weeks in at least four locally oriented weekly newspapers within the region, one of which shall be circulated primarily in Bergen County and the other three of which shall be circulated primarily outside of Bergen County but within the housing region.
- 5. Four or more of the following regional cable television stations or regional radio stations shall be used during the first month of advertising. The developer must provide satisfactory proof of public dissemination:
- i. 2 WCBS-TV (CBS Broadcasting, Inc.)
- ii. 4 WNBC (NBC Telemundo License Co., General Electric)
- iii. 5 WNYW (Fox Television Stations, Inc., News Corp.)

- iv. 7 WABC-TV (American Broadcasting Companies, Inc., Walt Disney)
- v. 9 WWOR-TV (Fox Television Stations, Inc., News Corp.) vi. 10

WCAU (NBC Telemundo License Co., General Electric) vii. 11 WPIX

(WPIX, Inc., Tribune)

- viii. 13 WNET (Educational Broadcasting Corporation)
- IX. 58 WNJB (New Jersey Public Broadcasting Authority)
- 6. Applications, brochure(s), sign(s), and/or poster(s) used as part of the affirmative marketing program shall be available/posted in the following locations:
 - i. Oakland Municipal Building
 - ii. Oakland Municipal Library
 - iii. New Jersey Housing Resource Center
- iv. Developer's Sales/Rental Office
 - v. Bergen County Administration Building
 - vi. Hudson, County Administration Building
 - vii. Passaic County Administration Building
 - viii. Sussex County Administration Building.

Applications shall be mailed by the Administrative Agent to the prospective applications upon request. Also, applications shall be made available at the developer's sales/rental office and shall be mailed to prospective applicants upon request.

- 7. The administrative Agent shall develop, maintain and update a list of community contact person(s) and/or organization(s) in Bergen, Hudson, Passaic and Sussex Counties that will aid in the affirmative marketing program with particular emphasis on contacts that will reach out to groups that are least likely to apply for housing within the region, including major regional employers.
- 1. Quarterly informational flyers and applications shall be sent to each of the following agencies for publication in their journals and for circulation among their members:

- iii.. Quarterly informational circulars and applications shall be sent to the chief personnel administrators of all the major employers within the region in accordance with the Region 1 Affirmative Marketing Plan.
- iv. Quarterly informational circulars and applications shall be sent to the following additional community and regional organizations:

Fair Share Housing Center

Bergen County Housing Coalition

The New Jersey State Conference of the NAACP

The Bergen County NAACP

Bergen Urban League

The Latino Action Network

- 8. A random selection method to select occupants of low and moderate income housing will be used by the Administrative Agent in conformance with N.J.A.C.
- 5:80-26.16(1). The Affirmative Marketing Plan shall provide a regional preference for all households that live and/or work COAH Housing Region 1 comprised of Bergen, Hudson, Passaic and Sussex Counties.
- 9. The Administrative Agent shall administer the Affirmative Marketing Plan. The Administrative Agent has the responsibility to income qualify low and moderate income households; to place income eligible households in low and moderate income units upon initial occupancy; to provide for the initial occupancy of low and moderate income units with income qualified households; to continue to qualify households for re-occupancy of units as they become vacant during the period of affordability controls; to assist with outreach to low and moderate income households; and to enforce the terms of the deed restriction and mortgage loan as per N.J.A.C. 5:80-26.1, et seq.
- 10. The Administrative Agent shall provide or direct qualified low and moderate income applicants to counseling services on subjects such as budgeting, credit issues, mortgage qualifications, rental lease requirements and landlord/tenant law and shall develop, maintain and update a list of entities and lenders willing and able to perform such services.

- 11. All developers/owners of low-and moderate-income housing units shall be required to undertake and pay the costs of the marketing of the affordable units in their respective developments, subject to the direction and supervision of the Administrative Agent.
- 12. The implementation of the Affirmative Marketing Plan for a development that includes affordable housing shall commence at least 120 days before the issuance of either a temporary or permanent certificate of occupancy. The implementation of the Affirmative Marketing Plan shall continue until all low-income housing units are initially occupied and for as long as affordable units exist that remain deed restricted and for which the occupancy or re-occupancy of units continues to be necessary.
- 13. The Administrative Agent shall provide the Affordable Housing Liaison with the information required to comply with monitoring and reporting requirements pursuant to N.J.A.C.5:80-26-1, et seq.

2022 MEETING DATES:

The Clerk distributed the tentative list of 2022 meeting dates. She advised that the date for the Oath of Office must be set. The consensus was to hold the Oath of Office on Sunday January 2nd at 12:00 noon.

ENGINEERING PROPOSALS:

Mr. Kunze stated that the Mayor and Council just awarded two bids for water main replacement projects. Boswell Engineering needs to be retained for Construction Administration and inspection. The cost for both projects is not to exceed \$65,000. Resolutions will be listed on the next agenda.

STREETSCAPE ORDINANCE:

Councilman Pignatelli questioned if the trees and benches standards are national figures. He would like to have seen a picture of the light posts. He wants to ensure it is what is outside of the Walgreens. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the language is stated in the ordinance. Councilman Van Eck stated that a picture was not included. Councilman Kulmala stated it was the recommendation of the Planning Board committee to continue with the same lamp that is in the Walgreen's area. Mr. Kunze advised that he can distribute a picture of the lighting and bench. The Shade Tree Commission has provided comments on the tree species. He suggested maybe sending this back to the Planning Board committee to discuss the Shade Tree Commission's comments.

RECREATION FEE ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS:

Mr. Kunze advised that the Recreation fee ordinance is amended every year as the budget is done to ensure that fees are in place for the upcoming year. The increases are fairly modest. The Recreation Commission is planning to offer four new summer camps and a new lacrosse program. The ordinance will be introduced at the next meeting.

AREA IN NEED OF REHABILITATION STUDY:

Councilman Kulmala brought this idea up two meetings ago for Ramapo Valley Road from Franklin Avenue to Oak Street. He stated that we are asking the Borough Planner, Burgis Associates, to do a study on that area to ensure it fits the criteria of the law for an area in need of rehabilition. Councilman Pignatelli stated this is a good investment. Councilman Kulmala explains that this law allows a tax abatement to property owners in the downtown to make improvements.

ZONING BOARD APPEAL:

Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the appellant has made arrangements to obtain transcripts. Mr. Chewcaskie had advised he wants them by the end of the month. He asked the Clerk to distribute the records from the Zoning Board hearings and he will discuss this again the first meeting of December. He explained that an appeal of a Zoning Board of Adjustment decision was filed by a resident. Pursuant to Borough ordinances, the Governing Body would review the appeal. Mayor Schwager explained that the Zoning Board granted a use variance for a non-conforming use. Our ordinance allows a resident to appeal the decision. The appellant must provide transcripts and then the Governing Body will set a hearing date. Councilman Pignatelli asked if the Council cannot talk to the Zoning Board members. Mr. Chewcaskie responded that the Council cannot talk to Zoning Board members. He stated that the Governing Body's obligation is to review the record and make a determination. Councilman Pignatelli asked if the Governing Body will get a verbatim transcript. Mr. Chewcaskie responded they would.

NEW BUSINESS:

Councilman Talamini asked if the Police Department could investigate Hickory Drive being used as a pass-through that the residents spoke about.

COUNCIL REPORTS:

Councilman Van Eck: He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and a Happy Hanukkah.

Councilman Kulmala: The Green Team will sponsor a Styrofoam drive on January 8th. The Green Team along with the Community of Commerce will sponsor a Styrofoam free business program. He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and Happy Hanukkah.

Councilman Pignatelli: He and Councilman Kulmala attended the League of Municipalities cannabis seminar last week. He distributed notes. He advised there will be a webinar on November 30th. The Cannabis Commission will be taking applications as of December 15th. He is not clear on the social equity aspect and if we have to provide it. He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and a Happy Hanukkah. He thanked our volunteers who are the backbone of the community.

Councilman Biale: The Skyview lining project is complete except for one area that needs to be addressed. The water main project will start in February. The interior work is complete on the Van Allen House. He attended the JIF MEL meeting at the League conference. He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and Happy Hanukkah.

Councilman Pignatelli reminded everyone that it is flu shot season and between 30,000 and 50,000 people die from the flu.

Councilman Talamini: The Christmas Tree and Menorah Lighting will be held December 5th at 5 pm. The Menorah will be lit early for Hanukkah. The Finance Committee will meet on December 1st. He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and Happy Hanukkah.

Councilman Slasinski: He advised that it is status quo at the Library. They will host a Holiday concert on December 7th and registration is required. He wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and Happy Hanukkah.
