Mayor Schwager entered at 7:06.

Discussion ensued over various tax appeals, the acquisition of the Sandy Beach property, and Affordable Housing litigation.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: By Mayor Schwager at 7:33 pm.

ROLL CALL: Mayor Schwager called the meeting to order and the Clerk called the roll. Present: Mayor Schwager, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Pignatelli, Talamini. Absent: None. Also Present: Lisa M. Duncan, Borough Clerk; Richard Kunze, Borough Administrator; Brian Chewcaskie, Borough Attorney.

MOMENT OF SILENCE:

MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT: Mayor Schwager announced this meeting is being held in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law duly announced and included in the schedule of regular meetings.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Schwager advised that the Mayors in Bergen County are talking to the Governor and demanding a meeting with P.S.E. & G. and Rockland Electric to discuss their storm response. Mayor Schwager has been told a lot of people are not getting the Borough's reverse 911 messages. She advised residents to go the Borough's website and register for Swift911. She advised residents to register their cell phones in case the landlines are out. Mayor Schwager advised that on March 1st, a meeting was held regarding security in the schools. More meetings will be held. Mayor Schwager attended the Japanese School graduation on March 12th. She is looking forward to meeting the new principal. Mayor Schwager congratulated Councilman Kulmala for participating in FLOW Follies. It is a worthwhile organization that raises scholarship money for Ramapo and Indian Hills students. On April 5th, AARP will hold a smart driver class at the Senior Center. Mayor Schwager advised there is a prescription drop box at the Police Station. Mayor Schwager brought forth the nomination of Carol Peterson for appointment to an unexpired term as Alternate 1 on the Environmental Commission.

Motion to Consent:

On motion of Councilman Biale, seconded by Councilman Pignatelli, the Council consented to the appointment of Carol Peterson to an unexpired term as Alternate 1 on the Environmental Commission to expire on December 31, 2018.

PROCLAMATION: NATIONAL POISON PREVENTION WEEK

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Biale, the following proclamation be adopted:

WHEREAS, Congress designated the third full week in March to be National Poison Prevention Week (NPPW) in 1961 and since then this week has helped to raise national awareness of the dangers of potentially poisonous medicines, household chemicals, and other substances; and

WHEREAS, every poisoning is preventable! From the youngest to the oldest, all people and even pets are at risk; and

WHEREAS, poison centers across the country will focus the public's attention on identifying poisoning hazards at home as well as learning ways to prevent poisoning emergencies; and

WHEREAS, a poison is defined as anything that is taken in the wrong amount, in the wrong way or by the wrong person; and

WHEREAS, unintentional poisoning is the leading cause of unintentional injury death in New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, drug overdose deaths including prescription pain medicine (opioids), heroin and fentanyl remain at epidemic proportions for both New Jersey and the United States. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the majority of drug overdose deaths (more than six out of ten) involve an opioid; and

WHEREAS, although the majority of reported poison exposures involve children five (5) years old and younger; the majority of poisoning deaths occur in adults aged 20 to 59; and

WHEREAS, childhood lead poisoning remains a major public health concern. Elevated blood lead levels can cause significant and permanent damage to the health and wellbeing of a young child. There is no safe level of lead. Stop a child's exposure to lead before it causes harm; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Poison Information and Education System (NJPIES), a division of the Department of Emergency Medicine of the New Jersey Medical School of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, provides expert advice, drug information, and poison prevention education to NJ residents through the 800-222-1222 Poison Help Hotline; and

WHEREAS, all services are free, confidential, multilingual and available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year even during bouts of Mother Nature; and

WHEREAS, the public can contact a poison expert by calling (1-800-222-1222), chatting (www.njpies.org), or texting (8002221222@njpies.org); and

WHEREAS, consumers must be aware that e-cigarette devices, hookah pipes and liquid nicotine may contain very high doses of nicotine in enticing colors, aromas, and flavors – increasing the likelihood that small children and pets will focus their attention on them. These products pose serious risk of poisoning; and

WHEREAS, poison experts urge residents to use our services as a resource for poison and drug information instead of consulting the internet for information that may not be accurate; and

WHEREAS, we encourage all residents to program the Poison Help Line 800-222-1222 into home, office, and cell phones because a rapid response can make a difference in preventing serious injury and saving lives; and

WHEREAS, the use of poison centers services saves residents both time and money. Most cases are managed in the convenience of the caller's home, requiring no hospital visit; and

WHEREAS, NJPIES is also involved with the state's efforts in homeland defense, counterterrorism, emergency preparedness and response, bio surveillance, and surveillance for clusters of poisonings and their sources (products, food and beverages, chemicals in the workplace and at home, environmental toxins, drugs and medicine, and animal and insect bites and stings);

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Linda H. Schwager, Mayor of the Borough of Oakland, do hereby proclaim the week of March 18-24, 2018 as

"National Poison Prevention Week"

In Oakland and encourage all citizens to pledge their commitment to ensuring the safety of themselves, their families, and their community.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Pignatelli, Talamini.

PUBLIC HEARING ON GRANT APPLICATION:

Nancy Krause, Chairman of the Environmental Commission, advised that the Sandy Beach property is at the foot of Spruce Street. The Borough submitted an application to Bergen County Open Space for funds to purchase the property. Ms. Krause advised that the Sandy Beach property is mentioned in the Open Space Plan. She spoke about the goal to build an interconnected Greenway to add to Great Oak Park which is adjacent to this property. She spoke about the Borough's Recreation programs and the potential use of the property for additional fields. She explained that protecting this area would protect from flooding as well. The addition of the Sandy Beach property would make 55 acres preserved in the Greenway.

The original application submitted was for \$ 2.8 million which was the asking price for the property. The appraisal done by the Borough came back at \$ 1.8 million. The application request was revised to \$1.4 million. She explained that the owner of the property would accept less but doesn't know how much less. She explained that the Borough can request Green Acres funding as well but that would require another appraisal. Ms. Krause advised that the County seemed receptive to the acquisition of the property.

Councilman Pignatelli explained that they want to link a walking trail from the Recreation field to Great Oak Park. The acquisition of this property would help with that goal. He asked if the Borough can ask the County for \$ 1.8 million. Mr. Kunze explained that the County grant would max at the appraisal price and the County will not fund 100% of the project. Councilman Pignatelli asked if the Borough can ask for more than \$1.4 million. Mr. Kunze responded we can but not \$ 1.8 million.

Councilman Biale commented that everyone is in favor of purchasing the property. He feels we can negotiate and get the owner's price down. Mr. Kunze explained that the Land Conservancy will help us negotiate a purchase price. Councilman Pignatelli asked who would make the offer to the property owner. Mr. Kunze advised that the Borough would make the offer once we hear

back regarding the grant application. Councilman Biale advised that we need to get approval from the County and have the gap funding in place.

OPENED TO THE PUBLIC

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Biale, this portion of the meeting be opened to the public.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Pignatelli, Talamini.

Erich Kamm, 9 Greene Way and member of the Environmental Commission, advised he is a member of the Bergen County Trust Fund and has recused himself from this application. The presentation that was made to the Bergen County Trust Fund by Ms. Krause was great. The County was very receptive. He explained that the seller is an environmentalist and wanted the property preserved. That is how the application for funding came about. The appraisal does not take into account other uses for the property. Mayor Schwager asked if the offer to purchase the property was real. Mr. Kamm responded that a letter of intent was provided to the County. Mr. Kamm explained that when the new flood maps are adopted, it would increase the value of the property. Councilman Levy advised that the changes to the flood maps are still at least two years away. There are still channel encroachments and setbacks. Councilman Biale commented that the value of the property can be subjective when we know how much the property owner paid for the property 20 years ago. Councilman Kulmala advised that he supports the project. It makes sense to acquire the property to build off of Great Oak Park and we could use the extra fields.

CLOSED TO THE PUBLIC:

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Biale, this portion of the meeting be closed to the public.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Pignatelli, Talamini.

Councilman Levy asked when the appraisal was done. Mr. Kunze responded it was done in the fall. Councilman Levy asked if we have gotten any comps to justify the asking price of \$ 2.8 million. Mr. Chewcaskie responded it is the appraiser's job to get the comps. Councilman Talamini questioned if it is possible the County would give us less if we amend our funding request to \$ 1.6 million. Mr. Kunze responded it is at the County's discretion to give a lower amount than the request. He doesn't think there is a downside to asking for additional money. Councilman Kulmala asked if it would jeopardize the application if we ask for additional money. Mr. Chewcaskie explained that the government works based on the appraisal price for grant funding. The offer that the seller received has a six month land use contingency. Motion to amend the amount request:

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Knapp, the funding request to the County for the Sandy Beach property be amended to \$ 1.6 million.

RESOLUTION 18-150 AUTHORIZE GRANT APPLICATION

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Biale, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, the Bergen County Open Space, Recreation, Floodplain Protection, Farmland & Historic Preservation Trust Fund ("Bergen County Trust Fund"), provides grants to municipal governments and to nonprofit organizations for assistance in the acquisition of lands for open space conservation purposes and/or outdoor recreation facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Oakland desires to further the public interest by obtaining a grant of \$ 1.6 million from the Bergen County Trust Fund to fund the acquisition of property at Block 2302, Lot 1, 68 Spruce Street, Oakland, NJ; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body has reviewed the Bergen County Trust Fund Program Statement, the County Program Open Space Policy and Procedures Manual, and the open space application and instructions and desires to make an application for such a grant and provide application information and furnish such documents as may be required; and

WHEREAS, as part of the application process, the Governing Body held the required public hearing on March 14, 2018 to receive comments prior to the submission of said application; and

WHEREAS, the County of Bergen shall determine whether the application is complete and in conformance with the scope and intent of the Bergen County Trust Fund: and

WHEREAS, the applicant is willing to use the Bergen County Trust Fund in accordance with such rules, regulations and applicable statutes, and is willing to enter into an agreement with the County of Bergen for the above-named project; and

WHEREAS, if the applicant is successful in acquiring said project through the use of a County Trust Fund grant, then the applicant will permanently preserve said project for open space conservation and/or outdoor recreation purposes through a recorded deed of easement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland:

- 1. That it is hereby authorized to submit the above completed project application to the County by this year's deadline established by the County; and
- 2. That, in the event of a Bergen County Trust Fund award that may be less than the grant amount requested above, the applicant has, or will secure, the balance of funding necessary to complete the project; and
- 3. That the applicant agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, and regulations, in its performance of the project; and
- 4. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION 18-151 AUTHORIZE RECYCLING TONNAGE GRANT APPLICATION On motion of Councilman Knapp, seconded by Councilman Biale, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act, P.L. 1987, c.102, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grant may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent and the spirit of the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act to use the tonnage grants to develop new municipal recycling programs and to continue and to expand existing programs; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has promulgated recycling regulations to implement the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act; and

WHEREAS, the recycling regulations impose on municipalities certain requirements as a condition for applying for tonnage grants, including but not limited to, making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality; and

WHEREAS, a resolution authorizing this municipality to apply for the 2017 Recycling Tonnage Grant will memorialize the commitment of this municipality to recycling and to indicate the assent of the Mayor and Council to the efforts undertaken by the municipality and the requirements contained in the Recycling Act and recycling regulations; and

WHEREAS, such a resolution should designate the individual authorized to ensure the application is properly completed and timely filed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland that Oakland hereby endorses the submission of the recycling tonnage grant application to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and designates Eugene MacMahon to ensure that the application is properly filed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that monies received from the recycling tonnage grant be deposited in a dedicated recycling trust fund to be used solely for the purposes of recycling.

RESOLUTION 18-152 CERTIFICATION OF EXPENDITURE FOR RECYCLING TAX On motion of Councilman Knapp, seconded by Councilman Biale, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, the Recycling Enhancement Act, P.L. 2007, chapter 311, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, there is levied upon the owner or operator of every solid waste facility (with certain exceptions) a recycling tax of \$ 3.00 per ton on all solid waste accepted for disposal or transfer at the solid waste facility.

WHEREAS, whenever a municipality operates a municipal service system for solid waste collection, or provides for regular solid waste collection service under a contract awarded pursuant to the "Local Public Contracts Law", the amount of grant monies received by the municipality shall not be less than the annual amount of recycling tax paid by the municipality

except that all grant moneys received by the municipality shall be expended only for its recycling program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough of Oakland that the Borough of Oakland hereby certifies a submission of expenditure for taxes paid pursuant to P.L. 2007, chapter 311, in 2017 in the amount of \$13,805.67. Documentation supporting this submission is available at 1 Municipal Plaza and shall be maintained for no less than five years from this date.

RESOLUTION 18-153 OPPOSITION TO BILL S-5

On motion of Councilman Knapp, seconded by Councilman Biale, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, Senate Bill #5 has been introduced which proposes to disproportionately shift control of the Police and Fire Retirement System (PFRS) from a balanced labor-management control to a union dominated (7-5) decision making structure; and

WHEREAS, PFRS is not a 401K, rather it is a defined benefit program; and

WHEREAS, PFRS is funded entirely by property taxpayer dollars, municipal and county governments will spend an estimated \$913.0 million in 2018 to subsidize the Police and Fireman's Retirement System (PFRS), while PFRS members will contribute approximately \$334.0 million to the defined benefit plan. In other words, property taxpayers will finance over 73.0% of PFRS in 2018, while PFRS members will pay 27.0%; and

WHEREAS, S-5 in its current form, will allow public safety union members and retirees to enhance their own benefits while forcing their public employers and New Jersey taxpayers to assume a disproportionate amount of the risk; and

WHEREAS, S-5 gives the labor-management board, at its discretion, and at such time and manner as it determines, the ability to:

- Enhance any benefit set forth in NJSA 43:16A-1 et seq; and
- Modify any such benefit as an alternative to an increase in the member contribution rate;
 and
- Reinstate, when appropriate, such reduced benefit to the statutory level without an additional contribution by the member.

WHEREAS, S-5 is a tax generative bill which will impact New Jersey taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, S-5 does not provide or include a funding source thereby making it another state imposed mandate which requires New Jersey taxpayers to pick up the tab;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland that we express our opposition to S-5 in its current form and communicate these concerns to the Governor and the Legislature.

The Clerk then read by title Ordinance No.18-Code-767 entitled: "AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF OAKLAND CHAPTER 59, ARTICLE VII, SECTION 59-45, ENTITLED "REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL ZONES" BY ADDING SECTION "J".

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Kulmala, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed on roll call vote.

BE IT RESOLVED that an Ordinance entitled, An Ordinance Amending The Revised General Ordinances Of The Borough Of Oakland Chapter

59, Article VII, Section 59-45, Entitled "Regulations Applicable To All Zones" By Adding Section "J"., be introduced;

That said Ordinance be considered for final adoption at a meeting on April 25, 2018 at the Municipal Court/Council Chambers, 10 Lawlor Drive, Oakland, New Jersey at 7:30 P.M.

That said Ordinance be published in full in The Record on or before March 19, 2018 together with notice of this introduction and of the time and place for further consideration for final passage, and that the Clerk post a copy of said Ordinance in the Municipal Building and make copies available to the public.

NEW BUSINESS:

Mayor Schwager spoke about the article in The Record regarding school elections. She sent an email to the Superintendent of Schools asking the Board of Education to meet with the Council publicly to discuss the school board election. She asked Councilman Talamini to go back to the Board of Education and ask for dates for a meeting.

COUNCIL REPORTS:

Councilman Knapp: He gave a report on the past two storms. The first storm took place March 2nd. The high winds caused downed trees and there were 1200 power outages. Most of the power was restored by the weekend. The Senior Center was used as a warming center and charging center. The second snow storm on March 8th and 26 inches of wet, heavy snow came down. Trees came down and Orange and Rockland customers in Bergen County lost power. Once the main line was repaired, power came back spotty. There were trees down and wires down and response was complicated when power was lost throughout town. Valley Middle School was used as a shelter and triage center by the First Aid Squad. The DPW plowed ahead of the First Aid and Fire Department for calls. He thanked the DPW for their efforts. The response from Orange and Rockland was lacking. It took two days but 30 trucks finally came in from Colorado. Trees were down and poles were down on Route 202 in front of the diner. He urged residents to stay away from downed wires because you never know when they are live. OEM Coordinator Roy Bauberger did a preliminary damage assessment and sent it to the State in case they declare a disaster. There will be a debriefing meeting held in the near future. He thanked the Police, Fire, First Aid, DPW, OEM, Board of Ed members, Council people and Roy Bauberger for all they did during the storm. He asked residents to shovel fire hydrants. The Fire Department responded to 28 calls during the storm. He reminded residents to register for SwiftReach reverse 911 on the Borough's website. This will allow for notifications from the Borough. Mayor Schwager advised that a resident emailed her about an extra pick up for vegetative waste. The first pick up will be in two weeks. It is not feasible at this time to schedule pick ups before that time. Councilman Knapp toured Great Oak Park. He gave kudos to Vanderbeck Tree Service for donating time to clear the great lawn. This will be a great asset to the Borough. He advised that the trail name signs are being ripped down.

Councilman Levy: He thanked OEM Coordinator Roy Bauberger for all his hard work. The Borough is lucky to have him. The DPW, Fire and Police Departments did an incredible job during the storm. The Flood Commission did not meet. Roy Bauberger will go through the river and catalog trees that are down. Councilman Levy spoke to the Shade Tree Commission Chairman. They are going to propose a shade tree deficit ordinance. There will be a fee to

remove a hazard tree and there will need to be a replacement tree planted. They will list the acceptable replacement trees. Mayor Schwager thanked Chairman Ed Clark.

Councilman Pignatelli: The Environmental Commission met March 6th. They will place two signs at Potash Lake. They spoke of having a student member. On April 21st, there will be a cleanup at Great Oak Park. He spoke about a proposed law to outlaw beekeepers. He hopes the Council will oppose that proposed legislation. He advised that residents can bring batteries to the DPW for recycling. He advised that the Environmental Commission is trying to get wood chips for Stewarts Woods. The Finance Committee met. The budget will be introduced on March 28th.

Councilman Biale: He suggested that the Environmental Commission should contact a tree service for wood chips. The Seniors thank the DPW. The DPW and Emergency Services all deserve thanks for their efforts during the storm. The Seniors held their St. Patrick's luncheon last Saturday. There will be an AARP driver course on April 5th at the Senior Center from 11 to 4. He spoke about bundling branches 4 feet long but no branches over 4 inches will be taken. The DPW will be picking up trees that are in the right of way. Councilman Biale advised that the operator of our sewer treatment plants is retiring. We are working on getting a replacement operator.

Councilman Kulmala: The OCC met last night. There is a new energy with the Commission and they will start working on the newsletter again. There are two openings for the alternate positions. There was a Library meeting today. He gave the status of the construction project. The Library will have a program on Screen time on April 18th. The First Responders did a wonderful job with the storm. He thanked residents for their patience. Councilman Kulmala had fun participating in FLOW Follies.

Councilman Talamini: The Public Events Committee will hold the Easter Egg Hunt on March 24th at 9:30 am. The raindate is March 25th at 1 pm. He urged participants to bring a basket to collect eggs. There will be refreshments provided and pictures with the Easter Bunny. The Public Events Committee is looking for members. There was a meeting held about security in the schools. Security is the main priority of the school district. It was a positive meeting and they are trying to improve school security every day. There will be another meeting.
