MOVE TO EXECUTIVE SESSION:

On motion of Councilman Pignatelli, seconded by Councilman Di Pentima, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed on roll call vote:

WHEREAS, Section 8 of the Open Public Meetings Act, Chapter 231, P.L. 1975, (N.J.S.A. 10:4-12) permits the exclusion of the public from a meeting in certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances presently exist,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Discussion ensued over personnel issues and sale of municipal property. No action taken.

CLOSE EXECUTIVE SESSION:

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilman Visconti, the Executive Session be closed.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: By Council President Pignatelli at 8:00 pm

ROLL CALL: Council President Pignatelli called the meeting to order and the Clerk called the roll. Present: Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti. Absent: Mayor Szabo. Also Present: Lisa M. Duncan, Borough Clerk; Richard Kunze, Borough Administrator; Brian Chewcaskie, Borough Attorney; Borough Engineer Kevin Tichacek.

SALUTE TO THE FLAG:

MOMENT OF SILENCE:

MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT: Council President Pignatelli announced this meeting is being held in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law duly announced and included in the schedule of regular meetings.

RECOGNITION OF KARIN DUBOWICK:

Councilman Pignatelli advised that Board of Health Secretary, Karin Kennedy Dubowick, received a National Health Week Recognition Award from the Bergen County Health Department. Ms. Dubowick was honored because she consistently exceeds job related expectations by taking extra steps to assure that the Borough has access to essential health-related information. Councilman Pignatelli commented that it is great to recognize one of the Borough employees. He gave Ms. Dubowick a certificate from the Mayor and Council.

OPENED FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION:

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilman Burns, this portion of the meeting be opened for public discussion.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

John Schaus, Shade Tree Commission, read a letter from the DEP regarding the Borough's Tree City USA status. He advised that the official certificate will be presented to the Borough at the State Arbor Day celebration on April 25<sup>th</sup>. The Borough will hold its own Arbor Day celebration and the date has to be set.

Frank Monaco, 60 Thackeray, spoke of the danger of hanging wood at the Stream House. He inquired about the library litigation. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that a portion of the litigation has been settled with the bonding company. However, litigation is still ongoing. Mr. Monaco questioned if there is an end in sight. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the Borough retained a special counsel. There has been case management so the case should be settled this year.

Roger Marchese, 44 Manito Ave., spoke about the tennis programs. He suggested that the tennis court improvements should not be done until a later time because the courts must be used for the various tennis programs. Councilman Pignatelli asked if the courts are in such disrepair that they are considered dangerous. Mr. Marchese responded that courts 1, 2 and 3 have been repaired before to make them safe for play. That can be done again. However, court 6 cannot be used at all. Councilwoman Stagg commented that the Borough will probably go for repairs for this season. We will rebid the project in the fall to see if more bidders respond. Councilwoman Stagg would like to go back to the County to request additional grant money in order to get all six

courts done. Councilwoman Stagg commented there is not enough time to do the project this year and to get it done in a responsible way.

Jonathan Blake, 20 Loyola Place, questioned if the Council was intending to apply for the Special Needs Grant for 2009. Councilman Burns commented that the deadline is this month to apply for the 2009 grant. If the Mayor and Council are going to support, we need to do a resolution. Mr. Chewcaskie advised we can do a resolution if we have all the information. Mr. Blake responded the grant is a total of \$ 10,000-it is a \$ 5,000 matching grant. The grant supports the start of new programs and existing programs. Councilman Pignatelli questioned if there is money in the budget. Councilman Di Pentima responded that the grant is for 2009 so there would not be money in the 2008 budget. The Mayor and Council can support the grant application. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the Mayor and Council can do a resolution supporting the grant application. If the application is filed, it can be ratified at the next meeting.

**MOTION:**

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilman Visconti, the Borough Administrator is hereby authorized to file a grant application for the Recreational Opportunities for Individuals with Disabilities grant in a matching amount not to exceed \$ 10,000.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES: MARCH 26, 2008**

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilwoman Marcalus, the minutes from the Mayor and Council meeting of March 26, 2008 be approved.

**ROLL CALL:** Yeas, Councilmembers Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti. Abstain, Councilman Burns.

**PROCLAMATION: AUTISM MONTH**

Councilwoman Marcalus read the following proclamation:

WHEREAS, the United Nations declared April 2, 2008 “Autism Awareness Day” and the month of April, “Autism Awareness Month” to highlight the need to help improve the lives of children and adults who suffer from this disorder and the parents and caregivers who look after them; and

WHEREAS, Autism is a complex brain disorder that has affected 35 million people worldwide. Autism inhibits a person’s ability to communicate and develop social relationships, and is often accompanied by extreme behavioral challenges; and

WHEREAS, according to recent reports, 1.5 million people in the United States have Autism, with a new case being diagnosed every 20 minutes. In New Jersey, the numbers are staggering-a new case is diagnosed in 1 of every 150 children-1 out of 94 boys; and

WHEREAS, early diagnosis and treatment of Autism is essential. In the United States, children diagnosed before the age of three, who are then properly treated, are estimated to have a fifty-percent chance of graduating from public school at an appropriate age level.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, John P. Szabo, Jr., Mayor of the Borough of Oakland do hereby, in support of the United Nations Declaration to raise awareness, proclaim the month of April as

“AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH”

in the Borough of Oakland. It is our hope that world leaders will address the global epidemic of Autism, stressing the importance of early detection and proper treatment, and through research, ultimately find a cure.

APPOINTMENT: ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

Council President Pignatelli brought forth the nomination of Alfred LoPilato for appointment to the Alternate II position on the Environmental Commission.

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilwoman Marcalus, the Council consented to the appointment of Alfred LoPilato as Alternate II on the Environmental Commission for a term that is due to expire December 31, 2009.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

APPROVAL OF RAFFLE LICENSE RL1014

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilman Burns, approval be granted for Raffle License #RL1014 for Temple Beth Rishon to hold a casino night on May 10, 2008 at the Gerard Berman Day School, 45 Spruce Street.

RESOLUTION 08-83 AUTHORIZE ENGINEER-UPDATE MAPS

On motion of Councilwoman Stagg, seconded by Councilman Burns, the following resolution be introduced, adopted and duly passed by roll call vote:

WHEREAS, there is a need to revise the street and drainage maps currently being used in the Borough by various departments; and

WHEREAS, Boswell McClave Engineering submitted a proposal dated March 25, 2008 for the revisions at a cost not to exceed \$ 3,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified that funds are available.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oakland hereby authorize Boswell McClave to proceed with the update and revisions to the street and drainage maps at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Discussion ensued. Councilwoman Stagg voiced concerns adding to the maps by hand. She stated that the Borough's maps should all be on CAD systems. She is not sure whether these maps meet those requirements or tie in with any other maps. She does not deny that the maps need updating but feels that they should be on CAD system. Mr. Tichacek stated that in the past the maps were manually updated. This proposal is to manually update the maps. He does not disagree that getting the maps on a CAD system would make them easier to maintain. Councilwoman Stagg questioned if the cost would be around \$ 80,000 to put the Borough maps on CAD system. Mr. Tichacek responded that it would be a substantial fee. He could have a proposal prepared for the next meeting. Councilwoman Stagg does not want to hold this up if this update is a necessity. Mr. Tichacek responded that the Council could approve this proposal and he will prepare another proposal for putting the maps on CAD system. Councilwoman Marcalus asked if Boswell does use CAD maps as a matter of course. Mr. Tichacek responded that Boswell is required to use CAD maps in some towns. Councilwoman Marcalus questioned if most towns use CAD and Mr. Tichacek responded he did not know. Councilman Visconti questioned if it would be possible to use CAD plans from a Developer as a basis for the work. Mr. Tichacek advised that this proposal is to research development and sub-divisions approved since 2003 and trace them on the existing maps. Councilman Burns asked if this would update the map for the entire Borough. Mr. Tichacek advised it would update any new road added since 2003. Mr. Kunze advised that Assistant Superintendent Marcucilli does not have accurate information for drainage systems at Ramapo River Reserve so the updates are necessary.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

#### RESOLUTION 08-84 AWARD BID-BARRIER NETTING

#### RESOLUTION 08-85 AWARD BID-TENNIS COURTS

Discussion ensued over the bids received for the barrier netting project and the improvements to the tennis courts. Mr. Kunze advised that the Borough received bids on tennis court project. There was only one vendor who submitted a base bid of \$ 291,592.50 and an alternate bid of \$ 275,942.50. That is a total of \$ 567,535. The engineering costs for the project are \$ 43,000. The total cost for improvements to all six courts would be \$ 610,535. At this time, the funds available are \$ 410,000 from a capital ordinance inclusive of a \$ 125,000 grant from Bergen County. The figures for improvements do not include the cost of lighting. Mr. Kunze suggested that the Borough apply to Bergen County for additional funds. Mr. Kunze advised that one bid was received for the barrier netting project. The price was \$ 180,000 for wood poles and \$ 145,000. The only available funding is the Recreation Trust Fund which has a balance of \$ 125,000 which is an unaudited figure. There is an encumbrance right now to the Trust Fund. If that encumbrance were cancelled, there would be \$ 167,000 which would be enough for the project as long as the engineering costs did not exceed \$ 24,000.

Councilman Burns commented he would move to reject both bids. He questioned if the encumbrances to the Trust fund were for the locks and flooring at the Danny D'Elia building bathrooms as well as several other projects. He commented that the barrier netting project is important because it involves safety netting but there are no funds available. There are not enough funds available for the tennis courts. If we were to use the entire amount in the ordinance, it would mean using the \$ 160,000 in the ordinance that was put aside for lighting. If we use that money now, we would have to bond for lights at a later time. Councilman Burns think the bids should be rejected and rebid in the fall. He would recommend rejecting bids for the tennis courts and the barrier netting. He does not know if the Recreation Commission Chairman would want to cancel the other projects encumbered to the Trust funds. Councilman Burns advised that we have 30 days to reject bids so the Council can hold off.

Councilman Di Pentima would agree to reject the tennis court bid because he would like the courts to be done the right way. In terms of the trust fund, at some point that money will be gone. Even if the encumbrances were cancelled, that would leave over \$ 40,000 of work to be done for which no money was budgeted this year. Councilman Visconti commented that the projects should be kept on the front burner because oil prices are not going down. If we want to do the project in August or September, we need to rebid now. Councilman Burns responded that he made his recommendation to rebid in the fall because Mr. Marchese had requested waiting until the end of August. We could go out to bid in June or July. Councilman Visconti commented that his point was not to wait. Councilman Burns commented that even if the project is rebid, it may have to be rejected again. However, we might get better prices at the end of the season.

#### MOTION TO TABLE RESOLUTION 08-84

On motion of Councilman Burns, seconded by Councilman Di Pentima, Resolution 08-84 to award the bid for the barrier netting project be tabled.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

#### MOTION TO REJECT BIDS FOR TENNIS COURT PROJECT

On motion of Councilman Burns, seconded by Councilwoman Stagg, the bids for the tennis court improvement project be rejected.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Burns, Di Pentima, Marcalus, Pignatelli, Stagg, Visconti.

#### WORK SESSION:

##### OCC BYLAWS:

Mr. Kunze advised that the Council had asked at the last meeting that a marked up copy of the bylaws be provided. This is up for discussion if the Council agrees to the changes proposed by the Communications Commission. Councilman Di Pentima advised he does not have an issue with what is being proposed except for the deletion of item 2.6 on page 3 which states that all work stemming from the use of Borough equipment is the property of the Borough. He is not sure why that would be removed. He also feels item 4.2 should be reworded. Councilman Pignatelli commented he is not sure why someone would want to remove item 2.4 which refers to "three strikes you're out". If someone is not fulfilling responsibility, he would think the Commission would want to remove that person. Mr. Chewcaskie responded that the municipal vacancy law would cover that. The bylaws are supposed to be prepared by the Communications Commission and approved by the Governing Body. Any questions or concerns that Council members have should go to the Administrator who will then bring them to the Communications Commission. Mr. Chewcaskie had a concern with removal of item 2.6 as well. Councilman Pignatelli commented that if someone submits a tape for airing, that means the tape could be returned. Councilman Di Pentima responded that was not the intent of that section. The intent of that section is if a Commission member tapes an event for airing. Councilman Pignatelli commented that Council members should submit their questions to the Administrator. Councilman Burns would like to have a set of the last original approved bylaws distributed for the next meeting.

**BOSWELL PROPOSAL-2008 NJDOT LOCAL AID PROJECT:**

Mr. Kunze advised that last year, the Borough received a grant in the amount of \$ 150,000 for Road improvements on Page Drive. We received a proposal for engineering services for that project. The original grant application requested \$ 287,500. The Borough only received \$ 150,000 from the State. Mr. Kunze did not see other funding for this project. The DOT allows the municipality to use up to 15% of the award amount for Engineering Services. Borough Engineer Tichacek confirmed that 15% is allowed for the design services. The State has always allowed construction inspection as a reimburseable item. Mr. Kunze advised then there is enough funding. Mr. Kunze commented that the Council may wish to submit an application for 2009 to do the balance of Page Drive. He suggested that the Council may want to wait to authorize the engineering for the entire project in order to reduce engineering costs and reduce the cost of the project. Mr. Kunze advised we have to seek approval for an extension of the grant. Mr. Tichacek advised with the price of petroleum on a steady climb, Boswell can always do the design now for the entire project. He doesn't know if it is better to wait for economy of scale for the project or to do what we can now knowing the price of the product and just do a smaller amount next year. Councilman Pignatelli responded he would rather move forward now because the price of crude oil is not going down. Councilman Di Pentima asked how long Page Drive is and questioned how far \$ 125,000 is going to get us. Mr. Tichacek responded this part of the project is designed to go from Yawpo Ave. to Dogwood Drive. Councilman Burns commented that the Borough could go out for additional funding. If it looks like we might get additional funding, we could bid the remainder of Page Drive as an alternate. Mr. Tichacek advised that the local aid grants are becoming more difficult to get. The chances are the DOT would look more favorably on the application if we have already done a section of the work. Councilman Burns questioned if Mr. Tichacek met with Assistant DPW Superintendent Marcucilli to see if Page Drive would be included in the road project. Mr. Tichacek responded he has not met with Mr. Marcucilli yet to go over the 2008 road program. Councilman Burns commented that the bid might be better if we include the Page Drive project with the rest of the road program. He also commented that we can go out to bid for the work next year. Mr. Tichacek advised that the Borough has 18 months to complete the project. That means the project has to be completed by June 2009. Councilman Di Pentima commented that he does not want this to drop because he does not want to lose \$ 150,000 in grant money. Mr. Tichacek advised that by waiting, petroleum prices may go up and then we might have to do less of the project. Councilman Burns commented we might get a better price if we go out to bid in January with the County. Councilman Pignatelli questioned if the design for the project was done. Mr. Tichacek responded that the proposal before the Mayor and Council is for the specifications. Councilman Visconti advised that the Council should approve the proposal so the engineering work can get done.

A resolution will be prepared for the next meeting.

**2009 NJ DOT GRANT:**

Mr. Kunze recommended that the application be submitted for the balance of the Page Drive project. The application is due in June. If there is consensus of the Council, Mr. Kunze will get a proposal from Mr. Tichacek to move forward with the application.

**BERGEN COUNTY OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION GRANT**

Mr. Kunze received notification that the next grant round is open and applications are due June 27, 2008. Mr. Kunze would like to identify a project and move forward with the application. The consensus of the Council was to apply for additional funds for the tennis court improvement project.

**EMPLOYEE MANUAL UPDATE:**

Mr. Kunze advised that as a member of the JIF, every other year the MEL requires the municipality to update its employment practices manual. If the municipality has a manual in place, it receives a lower rate. The Borough is in the process of updating the personnel manual and providing training to employees. Councilman Pignatelli questioned if a resolution is necessary. Mr. Chewcaskie responded that a resolution should be done at the next meeting to approve the revised manual.

**REPORT FOR CABLE FRANCHISE RENEWAL:**

Mr. Kunze advised that the current cable franchise expires April 3, 2009. The report from the municipality was due April 2008 but is not completed yet. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the Borough was supposed to provide a report to the Board of Public Utilities. We are waiting for recommendations from the Communications Commission. Mr. Chewcaskie learned that the Communications Commission did make recommendations but we have not received them yet. Mr. Chewcaskie has contacted the BPU to get an extension for the report. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the franchise renewal period starts three years in advance. Once he has received the comments from the OCC, he will file the report with BPU.

**RECREATION COMMISSION ISSUES:**

Mr. Kunze advised there are two issues that the Recreation Commission wanted to bring forth: coverage of coaches in regard to any claims and also to limit the operating hours for ice cream vendors so as not to draw revenue away from the Rec stand. Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the first inquiry is in regards to the scope of the Borough's indemnification. The Borough has a broad base indemnification. Any employee or volunteer is covered in a civil action case. There are limitations for criminal action cases. Mr. Chewcaskie may need more information from the Recreation Commission.

Mr. Chewcaskie advised that the request to limit hours for ice cream vendors is a policy decision that the Council has to make. The Recreation Commission is concerned with the ice cream vendors being in direct competition with the Recreation concession stand. The only regulation for the ice cream vendors is licensing by the Board of Health. Councilman Pignatelli commented he believes the vendors pull in the parking lots of the Recreation fields. The Council could preclude them from parking on Borough property but then the vendors may park in the street. Councilman Di Pentima commented he is not in favor of limiting operation of the vendors. It has been difficult to get volunteers to staff the Recreation stand. This provides an alternative when the stand is not open. He would rather the ice cream vendors be parked in the parking lot where it is safer for the children rather than being parked on the street. Councilman Di Pentima commented that the ice cream vendors don't sell the same items as the Rec stand so he does not think this should be a major issue. Councilman Burns commented that the Recreation Commission wants to limit the ice cream vendors to the hours when the Rec stand is not in operation. That would be complicated to enforce. There are different types of products sold at the Rec stand. Councilman Burns would like to know if the Council has the legal ability to limit the vendors. He also commented there is a concern with safety of children if the vendors park in the street. Councilwoman Marcalus commented she wouldn't vote to keep the ice cream vendors off Borough property.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

Councilwoman Marcalus commented that the Scleroderma Foundation sent in a request for a proclamation. She asked that this be listed on the next agenda.

Councilman Visconti brought forth the concept of a Borough-wide facility study. He is concerned we are falling behind on maintenance of buildings and not planning for this in the budget. He asked Assistant Superintendent Marcucilli to put together the basic information on the Borough buildings. In the future, Councilman Visconti would like the Council to put seed money away every year for building repairs and maintenance.

Councilman Visconti commented he would be interested in putting a non-binding referendum on the ballot for November regarding spending money on solar energy. Councilman Pignatelli commented that in the League of Municipalities magazine, a reference was made to a new office that will do energy audits. Councilman Visconti commented that we do have data from the County that came in last year. He commented that there was an article in today's paper regarding low interest loans for 40 to 60% of the cost of the work. It can be paid back in credits. He suggested that maybe a committee could be put together to review this.

#### **COUNCIL REPORTS:**

Councilman Di Pentima: the Communications Commission is looking for new members. The town survives on volunteerism so we need more volunteers. The Finance committee had a meeting on Monday and went through a number of items. The budget that was introduced will not be the final budget that is adopted. There is a lot more work to be done on the budget.

Councilman Burns: Recreation Commission does not meet until the end of the month. The Shade Tree Commission was officially notified about receiving Tree City USA designation. John Schaus will go to a ceremony in East Brunswick on April 25<sup>th</sup> to receive a plaque. The Shade Tree Commission did a presentation at the Senior Center last month that went well. Rockland Electric removed all the trees that we requested. The Borough paid to send a DPW employee to tree trimming school. The Shade Tree Commission is considering changes to the Shade Tree ordinance fees. They want to come up with a sliding scale. The Arbor Day celebration will possibly be held on April 26<sup>th</sup>. He will advise when the date and time are officially set. At the last meeting on Monday, the Shade Tree Commission met with Eden Oakland to discuss the removal of trees without a permit. They were extremely cooperative and paid that night for the permit.

Councilwoman Marcalus: The next Planning board meeting will be held on April 10<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm and the Lenape Valley Grill revised façade will be on the agenda. The school budget vote will be held on April 15<sup>th</sup> from 2 pm to 9 pm. Councilwoman Marcalus advised she spent a lot of years on the school board and she saw no frivolity with this year's budget. It is impossible to be frivolous with school budgets anymore. Councilwoman Marcalus attended the graduation ceremony at the Japanese school. They will welcome a new group of students tomorrow.

Councilman Visconti: advised of the programs being offered by the Library. On May 3<sup>rd</sup>, Broadway comes to Oakland with a fundraiser concert to benefit the Friends of the Library. The tickets are on sale at the Library. Commerce Bank has chosen the Library to be the recipient of a \$ 4,000 grant. Councilman Visconti advised that the Mayor completed the Smart Growth grant application last week.

Councilwoman Stagg: there was a meeting held with the DEP. The Borough is continuing to work hard to alleviate flooding problems. There are a lot of flooding issues upstream. There is a belief that the DOT had something to do with the problems when Route 287 was constructed. She spoke of the weir at Potash Lake. One division of the DEP wants to fix the weir and another division of the DEP says they cannot. Councilwoman Stagg advised that the Stream House was cabled. The next step is the study of the whole property. She would like to submit a grant

application. However, the County will not give the Borough money unless there is a study done. The Environmental Commission met this week and the Water and Sewer Committee will meet next week.
