

The Green Team has been working on re-certification actions for Bronze Level Sustainable Jersey recognition. Sustainable Jersey is a municipal certification program for NJ towns to go green, save money, and take steps to sustain their quality of life over the long term.

Dogwood Hills, Heights, Manito and Valley Middle Schools. The children brought home information including a parent pledge to commit to reduce idling. ### Big things are happening at the Recreation Complex this winter.

As soon as the final whistle blows, officially ending the soccer and football seasons, major construction will start taking place at the Alexander Potash Recreation Complex. The entire complex will undergo installation of new energy efficient and computer operated lights and poles. The lights come with a 25-year warranty on labor & parts; and with a 25-year free replacement of any burned out bulbs. We will no longer have problems with bad ballasts, poor circuits, wires over heating, entire boards needing to be replaced, DPW renting high reaching cherry picking machines and the constant renting of outside light towers. The new lighting system will serve recreation, the carnival and Oakland as a whole.

The second project, scheduled to begin in late winter is the long awaited walking path. This approximate ¾ of a mile track will be a place where ALL of Oakland can visit. Anyone can stroll or exercise on the path with the security of knowing there are no cars behind you and a smooth clear sidewalk in front of you. The walking path has generated a lot of excitement and will be a rousing new addition to an already great recreation complex.

The final project being installed at the complex will be a lightening detection system. This system will be installed by the upcoming baseball and softball seasons. Safety is always the number one priority of the Recreation Commission, and a lightening detection system, which will also be installed at Wells and Truman fields, will be one giant leap in the direction of safety. ### **FORE!** Happenings at Great Oak Park

Recently the old Muller's Park miniature golf course has been unearthed. This 18-hole gem was recently discovered while the cleaning much of the over growth of the park. Volunteers and the DPW have been exposing all the impervious surfaces in preparation of the DEP's next site visit. Other artifacts have been discovered such as basketball hoops, foundations of buildings, all kinds of balls and golf hole numbers. Besides being a spectacular 40-acre area of nature, it is a wealth of Oakland's most recent past.

The walking trails are now complete, along with signposts, which will direct hikers to their favorite route. The water walk area is clear and will be a vibrant place for people to sit, fish or just enjoy the mighty Ramapo. There will be so much at Great Oak Park that can be enjoyed once all the governing state agencies give the green light. ### OAKLAND DPW CHANGES TO RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

<u>Effective Immediately</u>—Due to changes in the recycling markets, there is now an oversupply of plastic recyclables and not enough demand for certain types of materials. As a result, the Borough's recycling marketer will not accept the following:

Plastics numbered 3, 4, 6 or 7 ~ Plastic bags, including, shopping bags, garbage bags and Ziploc bags

Plastic film wrapping, including garment bags ~ Styrofoam of any kind

Rigid plastics such as toys, crates, lawn furniture ~ Hoses ~ Pesticide containers

Frozen microwave trays or food platters, even if stamped 1, 2 or 5 ~ Wax cardboard boxes

In addition, the Borough's marketer will not be able to accept shredded paper.

Unfortunately, the above materials must now be placed in the trash or recycled by using the alternatives specified later in this notice. Please note that Oakland can no longer pick up recyclables placed in plastic bags and they will be left at the curb. If you need a container, the Oakland D.P.W. sells a 32 gallon blue recycling barrel for \$15.00 (check or exact cash only).

Single Stream Recycling continues to include all allowable paper/cardboard and allowable commingled recyclables (everything you have been putting in recycling except the items noted above) put out together for recycling collection every Wednesday. In addition, electronics and white goods will continue to be collected as they have been.

<u>Other Disposal Options</u>—Plastic bags: Shoprite and Stop N Shop collect clean and dry grocery bags Shredded Paper: The Borough will continue to run periodic paper shredding events to help residents properly dispose of sensitive and confidential materials.

The Borough understands that these changes are inconvenient and seemingly run counter to our efforts to 'go green'. However, they are unfortunately necessary at this time to maximize the amount of materials that can be recycled given current market conditions. As soon as markets improve we will revert back to collecting more types of materials for recycling. If you have any questions, please call the Department of Public Works at 201-337-8103/8104. ### Protect yourself and your family from the Flu!

According to the CDC, "Routine annual influenza vaccination is recommended for all persons aged 6 months and older who do not have contraindications." Now is the time to speak to your medical practitioner about getting flu shots for you and your family.

Senior Flu Shot Program: Thursday, October 30th, from 1 PM to 2 PM, at the Oakland Senior Center. For seniors 65+ with Medicare Part B Coverage ONLY (no HMO coverage).

Annual Rabies Clinic - Saturday, November 8th, 1 PM to 3 PM, at the Recreation Storage Facility, 24 Lawlor Drive. Dogs must be on a leash and cats in a carrier. Previous written proof of rabies vaccination is required for a three-year vaccination. All other pets will receive a one-year vaccination.

Welcome to fall and the requisite Flu season! It is a beautiful time of year and the weather has been thoroughly enjoyable. However, please don't be complacent. Be proactive! The flu season will arrive, snow or no snow! A reminder regarding CDC recommendations:

### Everyone 6 months or older should get the flu shot.

### Get it early, the longer you wait the more likely you will be exposed.

High risk individuals include: include young children, pregnant women, people with chronic health conditions like asthma, diabetes or heart and lung disease and people 65 years and older.

### OAKLAND POLICE DEPARTMENT

Believe it or not, summer is over and the fall season is upon us and that brings us to one of the most important times of the year – the start of school. Please be aware that the Police Department will be out enforcing speed limits around town. Sometimes around this time of year, it is easy to be distracted, but please be mindful of extra pedestrian traffic in town. The weather is still nice and children will be walking to and from school. Remember, it is the law for a motorist to STOP for pedestrians in crosswalks! It is equally important for motorists to obey crossing guards. Our crossing guards do an excellent job preserving the safety of our children so be aware of their presence.

Another issue the fall brings is that of falling leaves. Not only are they a nuisance to clean up but they also can be hazardous to the motoring public. Wet leaves on the roadway are just as slippery as ice, so please use extra caution when the roadway is wet and covered with leaves.

And just a reminder - winter will soon be here. Please be aware that the sidewalks and hydrants that are on your property are your responsibility. You are required to shovel your walks and clean the snow from around the hydrants. This will make the walkways safer for our children and other pedestrians and help out the fire department in case there is a fire emergency in your area.

George Washington and his officers stayed at the Van Allen House on July 14, 1777, on their way north to join more of their forces near West Point, when the troops and supply wagons got bogged down on the muddy trail that was the Ramapo Valley Road of those days. The troops camped down along the Valley Road. Washington wrote two letters addressed from the Van Allen House, of which we have copies at the House. History has recorded that General Washington led his troops up and down the 'Valley Road' on other occasions also, and stayed at other Old Dutch Houses in Mahwah, Wayne and Ho-Ho-Kus as well as Morristown. In honor of General Washington's visit in Oakland (The Ponds), we make a point of celebrating his birthday here each year.
