spring is upon us. Cabin fever will soon be gone and our roads will be filled with pedestrians and bicyclists.

It is important as drivers to be mindful of them sharing the roads; it is equally important for pedestrians and bikers to obey the rules of the road. Bicyclists must obey ALL of the same laws of the State of New Jersey that motor vehicle drivers abide by. For example, bicyclists must obey traffic signals and traffic signs. Pedestrians also must obey traffic signals and signs, such as when to or when not to walk into an intersection; and cross at designated crosswalks. Along

with bikers and walkers, motorcycles will be out in force. These vehicles are sometimes hard to see so it's important to be aware that they are out there.

Another road hazard is the left over grit and salt that is on the roadway. These hazards stay on the roads until the spring rains wash them away, so it is important to be careful of this.



Another issue in the spring is the emergence of the Black Bear.

Bears come out of hibernation in the spring and are hungry; they also have new born cubs at this time. A few things to remember going forward: DO NOT FEED THE BEARS!! This is very important because they become accustomed to people and sometimes lose their fear of humans. It is also important to try and keep your trash secure, as they see this as a meal.

Although they are cute, you should never approach bear cubs. Mom is never far away and if you happen to get between her and her cubs, she will become very defensive and protective of

them; and we know how protective moms can be!

If you do see a bear in your neighborhood, it's a good idea to let the Police Department know (201) 337-6171. We will respond to the scene and monitor the situation. To keep our residents safe, we have trained officers to deal with problem bears.

IF THIS IS THE YEAR YOU TURN THE BIG 50! CELEBRATE WITH A COLONOSCOPY!

Here is a little info so you can come clean for this procedure.

A colonoscopy is a procedure where a special doctor called a gastroenterologist examines the walls of your large intestines by looking through a long flexible fiber-optic scope. The gastroenterologist is searching for little growths called polyps that have the potential to turn into cancer. The doctor will remove these polyps thereby PREVENTING CANCER.

The Gastroenterologist will give you instructions on how to prepare for the colonoscopy. He will prescribe medications that will empty out your bowels. This is necessary so there are no "obstructions" blocking his view as he examines the inner walls of your colon with the endoscope.

You will begin to prepare yourself the day before you have the colonoscopy. You need to be ready for this day! So, two days before the Colonoscopy, pick up the medications the Gastroenterologist prescribed. Review with the pharmacist the correct way to prepare and take the "clean out" medications. Re-read the instructions you were given from the Gastroenterologist's office. Have clear juices, broth, and Jell-O (not red) available to drink the day before the colonoscopy. Also, since you will receive sedation during the colonoscopy, you need to recruit someone to drive you home after the procedure.

The day before the colonoscopy stick to the clear liquids. Make the prep more palatable by mixing it early in the morning and chill it in the refrigerator until it's time to take in the afternoon. You will be spending time in the bathroom so have some magazines or a lap top handy. Remember, do not eat anything solid —it will only get in the doctor's way! Do not eat or drink anything after midnight. The day of the colonoscopy dress comfortably. Have

a list of any medications you take ready to show the nurse and anesthesiologist. A nurse or anesthetist will start an IV in order to give you fluids and medicine for sedation during the colonoscopy. You will be monitored – heart rhythm, blood pressure and oxygen level throughout the procedure and while you are waking up from anesthesia.

After the procedure you may feel a little bloated and have an urge to pass gas. Go ahead- since you took your prep correctly it is only the air the doctor put in.

For those who have survived this winter, with spring begins projects both in and outside the home. Any licensed contractor will provide this information. Don't get pressured into unnecessary repairs or work. Any contractor that is not licensed as a Home Improvement Contractor cannot work on your home. If you find yourself in this situation please contact this office or the Oakland Police.

The Fire Prevention Bureau wants everyone to remember that when the clock changes it is time to change the battery in your smoke detectors. All smoke detectors have batteries and they need to be periodically checked and changed. If you need information regarding this or the location of detectors please contact Ralph Porrino, Fire Inspector at (201) 227-9616.

Residents are also reminded that fuels used for generators of other liquid fuel equipment should be located in a safe and stable area. Keep these fuels out of the garage area and areas of extreme heat and unventilated areas.

Residents who are selling their home or changing tenants need to make sure that a Continued Certificate of Occupancy is obtained at least two weeks prior to the selling or leasing date. A Continued Certificate of Occupancy application can be picked up at the Oakland Building Department.

OAKLAND FIRST AID SQUAD CELEBRATES 60 YEARS

The John Robert Walker, as it is officially named, was started in 1954 by John and Vivian Walker in memory of their son, John Robert Walker. Today we continue the tradition of providing free Emergency Medical Service to our residents and businesses. We have been able to do this through the continued support of the community and the Mayor and Council. Although financial support is very important, we need people to keep us going to! We responded to a total of 891 calls last year. Of those, 654 patients were transported to the hospital, 10 calls were fire department assists, and we did 19 stand-by for sporting or community events.



Pictured are two of our members. Connie Monks has been a member since the beginning. Connie responded to emergencies for many years and continues to contribute by attending our meetings and preserving our history. Valerie joined as a junior member while she was still in high school. She actively responds to emergencies while continuing her studies in college. Our members are accountants, mechanics, teachers, students, medical professionals, retired, self employed, unemployed. OAKLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT

Since 1909, the all-volunteer members of the Oakland Fire Department have been serving the residents of this great community. In addition to responding to emergency service calls, we provide our Community with public service information through tours of our firehouses, participation at School events and through our annual Fire Prevention week program that helps education the youngsters of our community on fire safety.

As well as serving the residents of Oakland, we are also members of the North West Bergen Mutual Aid Group which means we help our neighboring communities, also volunteers, when they need assistance and they likewise do the same for Oakland. The men and women that make up the Oakland Volunteer Fire Department are all residents of Oakland. As first responders we work closely with the members of the Oakland Police Department, Oakland First Aid Squad volunteers and Oakland DPW.

Thankfully, many of the calls we respond to are not life-threatening. A typical call lasts approximately 51 minutes and can average 16 responders covering two support apparatus and maintaining our fire desk operations. However, there are times when calls are more serious such as during hurricanes Sandy and Irene where we ran continuous shifts for nearly 48 straight hours.

In just the past three years, our department has averaged close to 430 emergency service calls per year. That means that on an annual basis our members put in over 10,000 man-hours responding to emergency service calls. In addition to these service calls, we will spend over 3,100 man-hours training on the latest fire, river and ice rescue techniques. Additional time is spent inspecting and servicing our equipment to keep things in good operating order.

Through your generous support during our fundraising efforts, we have been able to purchase equipment and perform improvements at our firehouses without asking for funds through the Municipal Budget. Some of these purchases and building improvements include: Purchasing of the Scuba truck, two new Assistant Chief's cars, the Suburban support vehicle, the reconditioning of the Scuba truck for Swift Water Response, the refurbishment of the service kitchen at Company 1 (a designated Town shelter site) and the construction of the Radio Dispatch Fire Desk and its equipment.

The Oakland Fire Department is always looking for additional volunteer firefighters to protect the lives and property of our neighbors. For more information, and an application for membership, come to the Yawpo Ave firehouse any Monday night at 7:00 PM and ask to speak to one of the our Chiefs or Officers.

We want to thank the Residents of Oakland, and the Mayor and Council, for your continued support of our efforts.

The Great Oak Park is moving along. If interested in participating or just want to hear about the progress of the Park, attend their regular monthly meetings. The committee is anxious to hear your ideas.

Sewers. They are coming! When I moved into Oakland with my husband in 1973, the realtor told us, "Sewers are coming." Fast forward 41 years and now you hear me saying the same words, "Sewers are coming." The difference is that I am focusing full attention on this project and promise to work diligently towards finally bringing sewers into our town.

Completed Library Construction. The litigation is completed. Architects have visited the structure and submitting proposals. Shortly, bids will be accepted, and then we can finally move forward...speaking of the library, thank you to Abby Sanner, Library Director, who has transformed the library from an old fashioned quiet reading room to a bright, welcoming, and technologically inviting community resource center.

IT'S TIME TO COME HOME. I received some very disturbing news—many residents left our library and have begun using the Franklin Lakes Library. The increased usage in Franklin Lakes by Oakland residents has resulted in a \$4,500 annual surcharge to BCCLs. Come back to our library. Visit our facilities. You will



The team, Adam Akovity, 14, Nigel DaSilva, 13, and Christopher Leymeister, 14, teacher Judith Vihonski and mentor Robert Akovity received a \$5,000 STEM scholarship sponsored by the National Society of Professional Engineers (NSPE).

After a summer of research, the team began their engineering work in September



witting an essay on future transportation, designing a city on SimCity software, creating a tabletop city model, and preparing a 7-minute presentation. Their creation was Whenua Aotearoa, a city located near the Bay of Plenty, on New Zealand's South Island.

Key elements of their city included an educational system that offered individualized learning experiences. Teachers and students used HoloDesks, three-dimensional workstations, to project holo-

Two teams of Valley Middle School sixth grade students were selected as Honorable Mention Winners in the 2014 Toshiba/NSTA ExploraVision competition. The ExploraVision competition requires groups of students to select a current technology, research it, think what it might look like in 20 years, and describe the design process, the positive and negative consequences, and obstacles. The Honorable Mention award places the teams in the top 10% of all ExploraVision projects submitted. This year, over 14,000 students participated.

Sarah Applebaum, Christopher Flug, and Eric Ming envisioned the Smog Shield, a transparent breathing mask that filters pollution. Victoria Boyce, Stephan Klein-MacDonald, and Gavin Vallestero developed the Mending Med, a bandage of the future made with bacterial nanocellulose to speed the healing process.



In Addition, Their engineers created a unique Manure-To-Methane (MTM) system that collects and processes the animals' waste and turns it into methane that drives fuel cells to generate clean electric power.
