WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.2 through 7.5, the Borough of Oakland has been declared eligible to participate in the program by the Division of Local Government Services, and the Chief Financial Officer has determined that the local government meets the necessary conditions to participate in the program for the 2018 budget year..

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Body of the Borough of Oakland that in accordance with the N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.6a & 7.6b and based upon the Chief Financial Officer's certification, the Governing Body has found the budget has met the following requirements:

- 1. That with reference to the following items, the amounts have been calculated pursuant to law and appropriated as such in the budget:
  - a. Payment of interest and debt redemption charges
  - b. Deferred charges and statutory expenditures
  - c. Cash deficit of preceding year
  - d. Reserve for uncollected taxes
  - e. Other reserves and non-disbursement items
  - f. Any inclusions of amounts required for school purposes.
- 2. That the provisions relating to limitation on increases of appropriations pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2 and appropriations for exceptions to limits on appropriations found at N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.3 et seq., are fully met (complies with CAP law).
- 3. That the budget is in such form, arrangement, and content as required by the Local Budget Law and N.J.A.C. 5:30-4 and 5:30-5.
- 4. That pursuant to the Local Budget Law:
  - a. All estimates of revenue are reasonable, accurate and correctly stated.
  - b. Items of appropriation are properly set forth.
  - c. In itemization, form, arrangement and content, the budget will permit the exercise of the comptroller function within the municipality.

5. The budget and associated amendments have been introduced and publicly advertised in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Local Budget Law, except that failure to meet the deadlines of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 shall not prevent such certification.

6. All other applicable statutory requirements have been fulfilled.

### WORK SESSION:

### TITLE 39 ENFORCEMENT-CROSSROADS SHOPPING CENTER:

Mr. Muhlstock advised that the Crossroads Shopping Center has a lot of interior roads that need to be regulated by the Police. This ordinance would enable them to enforce regulations. Mayor Schwager spoke of the dangers in that shopping center. Councilman Biale spoke about speeding in the parking lot. Mr. Muhlstock explained that this ordinance would codify certain regulations such as parking, stop signs, one-way traffic. There will be signage placed in the shopping center. The Police would then be able to enforce the regulations in that shopping center.

Frank Monaco, 60 Thackeray, suggested putting up speed bumpts to slow people down.

### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOLS ALIGNMENT REVIEW:

Mr. Kunze explained that this relates to the sidewalk program around the schools. This is meant to address Heights and Valley Middle Schools and is backed by a \$ 290,000 Federal Safe Routes to Schools grant. The first step is to give feedback regarding our alignment of sidewalks so the Engineer can submit to DOT for approval for the sidewalks. Borough Engineer John Yakimik advised that he met with the Police and did a site visit. He explained that only preliminary scoping was done and further work needs to be done to determine if there is enough room for cars to pass once sidewalks would be put in. He showed the preliminary route in the Heights section. Councilman Knapp asked if there will be input from the residents. Mr. Kunze explained that once we get through this process, there should be a community meeting to see if there is support for the sidewalks. If the community does not support the project, then there should be no repurcussions with the grant. Councilman Talamini asked if the school was included in the decision. Mr. Kunze advised that Valley Middle School was involved when we applied for the grant and they submitted a letter of support. Councilman Kulmala asked if the schools will have input. Mr. Kunze responded that we can have a meeting with them. Councilman Knapp asked if the utilities will be above ground or underground. He asked about having a striped sidewalk. Mr. Kunze responded there is a striped sidewalk on Stevens Place. Councilman Knapp asked if there have been complaints in the Heights neighborhood about not having sidewalks. Mr. Kunze responded that several years ago, the Governing Body prioritized expanding sidewalks around the schools. There were discussions with the Police Department about where sidewalks would be most needed.

Discussion turned to the route for Valley Middle School sidewalks. Councilman Kulmala asked if it would make more sense to have the sidewalk on the park side of Oak Street. Mr. Yakimik explained that this preliminary route was the genesis of a walk-through with the DOT. They took several routes and they want to traverse as little of the vehicular roadways as possible. Mayor Schwager commented that it would make more sense to have the sidewalk on the park side of Oak Street. Councilman Kulmala asked if the sidewalk could be connected by the Library. Mr. Yakimik responded that it would make sense. Councilman Knapp would like to see what the Traffic Officer and Police Captain have to say about sidewalks in the Heights section. Mr. Yakimik explained that he met with Traffic Officer Fiore and Captain Sanzari and they had no objections to the proposed route. He will ask them again if they feel there is a need for these sidewalks. Councilman Knapp stated it is not worth putting sidewalks in if they are not needed. Councilman Kulmala asked if the sidewalk on Oak Street could be continued down to the Recreation field. Mr. Kunze will have to talk to the DOT to see if it meets the purpose of the grant. Discussion turned back to the Valley Middle School sidewalk route. Student Councilmembers Watters and Spinella explained that most students walk across the Borough Hall parking lot to the stairs. Mr. Yakimik explained that if the sidewalk leads to the stairs, it will

hinder ADA requirements. Councilman Talamini commented that if a better route is put in, the students will be more likely to use it.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Councilman Levy advised he met with DPW Superintendent Anthony Marcucilli regarding a recycling center. They discussed a couple of potential locations. The DPW roll off truck is capable of holding a dumpster. Mr. Marcucilli estimates the start up costs would be approximately \$50,000 which would include the dumpster, concrete pads, curb cutting. The recycled materials can be disposed of in Passaic so they wouldn't have to go to Newark. He spoke about the first quarter numbers having an increase in garbage and a decrease in recycling. Councilman Biale questioned what would happen if residents didn't utilize a recycling center. Councilman Kulmala asked about what he cost would be to go back to single stream recycling.

Mr. Kunze advised he had a meeting today with Mr. Marcucilli and Recycling Coordinator Eugene MacMahon regarding a recycling depot. The ballpark start up costs will be between \$50,000 and \$60,000. It is estimated that it will occupy 25% of one employee's time based on figures obtained from Franklin Lakes regarding their recycling center. Councilman Knapp suggested it might be smart to go back to single stream recycling. Mr. Kunze needs to ask the attorney. It probably cannot be done this year and this year's budget does not support that move. He explained that there are only two months worth of data. There was a 25% reduction in recycling and a 3% increase in garbage in those two months. He cautioned the Governing Body on making a move using only two months of data. He explained that this can be discussed further in the future. Councilman Biale advised that people's recycling habits change from winter to summer so he thinks we should wait to see the data before investing in a dumpster and concrete pads. He would rather go back to single stream than spend the money on a recycling center. Councilman Talamini asked if we inquired about getting a double pick up on the same day. Mr. Kunze responded it was essentially the same price as having single stream pick up. Councilman Kulmala asked for a quarterly update on the data.

## **COUNCIL REPORTS:**

Councilman Talamani/Councilwoman Watters: The Memorial Day Parade will take place on May 27<sup>th</sup> at 1 pm. The carnival will be held June 13<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup>. Fireworks will take place on Friday June 15<sup>th</sup>. The next meeting of the Public Events Committee will be May 14<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm at the Senior Center. They are looking for more members. Councilman Talamini congratulated the students on doing a great job.

Councilman Kulmala/Councilwoman Watters: The OCC held their last meeting on April  $7^{th}$ . The Borough sent its first official tweet on April  $24^{th}$ . The OCC is looking for volunteers for the television committee. An update on the Library renovations was given. Recreation will list sign up information on the website.

Councilman Biale/Councilman Gentile: The Senior Center Director Rose Burik will retire after 25 years of service. He congratulated Rose and wished her many happy and healthy years. The Senior Art Show at the Library has been extended to May 23<sup>rd</sup>. There will be a luncheon at the Brownstone on May 22<sup>nd</sup>. The Senior Club meeting tomorrow will have a presentation on prescription medications. The DPW will hold a shredding event on Saturday May 12<sup>th</sup>. The National Day of Prayer was held last week. Councilman Biale attended a meeting with Rockland Electric regarding smart meters. Residents received notice that smart meters are coming. These meters eliminate the need for meter readers and will record electrical data. Thirty three states already have smart meters. Residents will be able to opt out.

Councilman Levy/Councilwoman Spinella: The Flood Commission will meet on March 14<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm at the Senior Center. The Station Park Committee will meet next week. The Grant Committee is meeting later this week. Planning Board will meet tomorrow night at 7 pm.

Councilman Knapp/Councilwoman Spinelli: The First Aid Squad will hold their meeting on June 4th. The Municipal Alliance will meet on June 11th. The Fire Department will meet on June 18th. The quarterly Public Safety meeting will be held in June. Great Oak Park Committee will meet on June 4th. Tom Vanderbeck has been clearing the great lawn. The Band shell will be installed next spring. They are working on raising money for the driveways to be paved. A local girl scout, Katherine Bonini, will install five signs around the Park which will identify Pleasureland artifacts. She has been raising funds for the project and held a bake sale this past week. A boy scout is going to mount two old historical signs. The Environmental Commission will build a butterfly garden. A girl scout is looking to install donated bird and bat houses in the Park.

#### OPENED FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION:

On motion of Councilman Biale, seconded by Councilman Kulmala, this portion of the meeting be opened for public discussion.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Talamini.

Frank Monaco, 60 Thackeray Road, commented that the students did an excellent job tonight. He asked if the Borough owns the right-of-way to install sidewalks. Mayor Schwager advised this discussion was because the Borough received funding from the Safe Routes to Schools grant. Mr. Monaco suggested that if the Borough were to have a recycling center, we should get small compactors.

## CLOSED FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION:

On motion of Councilman Biale, seconded by Councilman Levy, this portion of the meeting be closed to public discussion.

ROLL CALL: All yeas, Councilmembers Biale, Knapp, Kulmala, Levy, Talamini.
